





Litter Cleanups

Our annual Earth Day Cleanup was a success, with 96 volunteers helping to collect nearly 100 bags of trash. Volunteers floated the James River from the Joe Crighton Access to Southwood and removed litter from the shorelines of Lake Springfield.

The 2022 River Rescue was a hit, with 65 volunteers braving the heat to clean the James River, starting at Shelvin Rock and ending at Hootentown Canoe Rental and Campground. Over 200 bags of trash, 500 pounds of scrap metal, and 20 tires were removed from the river. For their efforts, volunteers were treated with a lunch sponsored by Bass Pro Shops and a cold Blue Canoe Pale Ale provided by Springfield Brewing Company. Thank you to all of our volunteers who helped make it a successful event!



Fifteen volunteers assisted with our biannual spring and fall Adopt-A-Highway litter cleanups near the confluence of the James and Finley Rivers at Jamesville. Thanks to their efforts, 26 bags of trash were kept out of our beloved James River.

In May, JRBP staff assisted city of Ozark employees on a Finley River cleanup from the Lindenlure access to Finley River Park. Forty six volunteers covered 5 miles of stream, removing 50 bags of trash and 19 tires from the Finley River.



Over 3,700 pounds of trash

removed from our local waterways by more than 300 volunteers!

We continued our close partnership with the City of Springfield by officially adopting a portion of Fassnight Creek through the City's Adopt-A-Stream program.

In June, we partnered with staff from the Southwest Waste Water Treatment Plant to host our annual United Way Day of Caring Cleanup, where 35 volunteers from local businesses cleaned up a

stretch of Wilson's Creek. Volunteers removed over 2,000 lbs of trash and 10 tires during the morning cleanup.




Rain Barrel Rebate Program



Rainwater harvesting is simple, fun, and helps connect people with our water resources. Thirteen homeowners were awarded \$1,009 in rebates, with a harvesting capacity of 2,077 gallons of rainwater to be used on their lawns and gardens. For Springfield residents, a rainwater harvesting system is a popular component of the City's Yard Ethic program. Septic Pumpout Rebate Program



It was another banner year for our Fresh Flush Septic Pumpout Rebate Program. Eighty-two property owners in the James River watershed received a grand total of \$7,550 in rebates. We continued our partnership with Greene County and City Utilities to offer expanded rebates in portions of the Upper James River watershed. Residents in portions of Greene and Webster counties are eligible for \$100 and \$150 rebates, while residents living outside the expanded rebate zone are eligible for a \$50 rebate.

Sustainable Landscapes



In 2022, two Springfield residents were awarded a Gold Yard Ethic certification and one received a Silver certification. One of the Gold certifications was JRBP lifetime member Loring Bullard. Two of the certification checklist components may be satisfied by participating in our Lawn Steward soil testing program and by





applying for a rebate on a newly installed rainwater harvesting system.

JRBP staff collected soil tests for 19 homeowners and the City of Republic Parks Department. We also updated and streamlined our nutrient management plan template and trained more staff on soil testing and plan-writing procedures.

Education & Outreach

We welcomed our newest employee, Brooke Widmar, who serves as the Education Outreach Coordinator. While education has always been a large part of JRBP's mission, this is the first time we've had a full-time educator on staff. After starting in April, Brooke was able to jump in on existing projects, and create new ways to connect community members with their local water resources.



At the beginning of the year we wrapped up our virtual members-only speakers series with presentations on Gigging in the Missouri Ozarks, Mussels of the Ozarks, Foraging the Ozarks, and Ozark Hellbenders. Staff worked with Academy of Exploration students on a stream field day, and with OTC students during classroom presentations. JRBP was well represented at many tabling events, including the Lawn & Garden Show, Springfield Conservation Nature Center's Native Plant Sale, and the Chase Charity Fair.





Our summer was focused on summer school lessons and ecotourism opportunities. We worked with 5th grade students from Nixa's John Thomas School of Discovery on a four-week series of water quality lessons which culminated in a field trip to a local creek for water sampling and other activities. Republic's 5th grade students and Springfield's Phelps School students also received summer school lessons on topics such as watersheds, citizen science, macroinvertebrates, and more. In August, through a partnership with Stream Teams United, JRBP staff provided on-the-water education for a 3-day, 22-mile float on the lower James River for a Paddle MO James trip. Over 40 participants took to the water during our trip, and more than half of them were experiencing the James River for the first time.

The fall season was busy with opportunities to work with children and adults of all ages, from the smallest preschoolers to our oldest birders. For adult education, classes on nature journaling and fish printing were taught by JRBP staff during the Wonders of Wildlife School in Cassville. We offered stream-side training for the newest Missouri Master Naturalist class, and gave a presentation to the Greater Ozarks Audubon Society chapter. We worked with kids galore through Springfield's Homeschool Outdoor Fair and a fishing trip with 7th grade students from Reeds Spring Middle School.



Wilsons Creek 319 Implementation Project

We closed the book on our Wilson's Creek 319 Implementation Project in 2022.

Here are a few highlights from the final grant period:

- In February, a section of Fassnight Creek was stabilized by the City of Springfield staff under the supervision of an experienced local contractor. The various steps of the project were captured in a report that will be used as a handbook for streambank stabilization projects within the Springfield city limits.
- In March, we held our final round of macroinvertebrate monitoring along South Creek. Collected data was sent to both the City of Springfield and Missouri Stream Teams.
- In June, 28 volunteers from the Nova Center of the Ozarks and the Missouri State University Marketing and Communications Department participated in our annual cleanup event for the United Way of the Ozarks Day of Caring. The City of Springfield's Southwest Wastewater Treatment Plant joined us this year to provide logistical assistance as eager volunteers removed over 2,000 pounds of trash and 10 tires from Wilson's Creek.
- In July, 35 volunteers sampled 65 sites within the James
 River watershed during our triennial volunteer Snapshot
 Sampling event. JRBP staff and City of Springfield
 employees served as runners and assisted with analyzing
 samples at the Southwest Wastewater Treatment Plant
 lab. A volunteer appreciation event was held in October at
 Springfield Brewing Company, and a final report will be
 released in early 2023.
- We produced a brochure focusing on nutrients and nonpoint source pollution, and partnered with the Beaver Watershed Alliance on a second edition of the Riparian Planting Guide of the Ozarks.
- JRBP partnered with staff from the Missouri Department of Conservation to develop management plans for four conservation easements along Wilson's Creek.

- Four interpretive signs were developed and placed along Fassnight Creek. These signs describe green infrastructure projects at the Springfield Art Museum, urban stream restoration, riparian protection, and conservation easements.
- In the spring, the City of Springfield's stormwater improvement and streambed restoration at the Springfield Art Museum was completed. JRBP contributed a grand total of \$188,733.75 in grant funds to water quality improvement projects along Fassnight Creek.
- JRBP staff collected eleven soil tests and prepared three-year nutrient management plans for property owners in the grant area.



Fundraising

Blue Canoe

JRBP's partnership with Springfield Brewing Company continued with exuberance, as both JRBP and SBC celebrated our 25th anniversaries in 2022. We received a \$918 donation from the proceeds of Blue Canoe sold at SBC and local



distributors. In addition, SBC sponsored the James River Float Series and Outdoor Education Series with 37

North Expeditions, and hosted JRBP staff for a Paddles and Pints Membership Drive.

Small Grants

Each year, JRBP applies for a number of grants to cover the costs of programs and materials not included within our larger grants and community contracts.

MEEA Environmental Educator Mini-Grant (\$250)

JRBP received funding from the Missouri Environmental Education Association to purchase supplies for watershed education lessons. The supplies purchased were well-used in 2022 and will continue to help educate the community about our local water resources.

Smith Atwell Girls Recreational Grant Program (\$500)

Funding from the Community Foundation of the Ozarks' Smith Atwell Grant is being used to plan a Women's Float on the James River, coming in Spring 2023.

Marshfield Area Affiliate Grantmaking Program (\$500)

Funds received from the Community Foundation of the Ozarks' Marshfield Affiliate are being used to provide watershed education lessons to Marshfield students.

ExtremeTerrain's Clean Trail Grant Program (\$250)

JRBP received a grant from ExtremeTerrain to buy supplies for a trash cleanup along the Wilson's Creek Greenway Trail at Rutledge Wilson Farm Park. The grant purchased 16 new trash grabbers that will be used for years to come.



AmeriCorps

In January 2023, our AmeriCorps volunteer, Allison Osredker, ended her 12-month service with JRBP and Missouri Smallflows Organization. Here is a reflection from her about her experience:

"During my time as an AmeriCorps VISTA member for the James River
Basin Partnership I gained experience working with non-profit organizations, building partnerships, organizing events, and so much more. This position was extremely enriching not only for my professional development, but it has also expanded my interest in conservation work as a whole.

Highlights of my service include networking, hands-on field experience with water quality monitoring and soil testing, learning about grant research and writing, and visiting classrooms to teach water quality lessons to students.



My favorite part of my service is how much independent development I had. It pushed me out of my comfort zone to reach out to organizations, individuals, and department leaders to work with them on a project or ask for their financial support. I gained a lot of public speaking experience - which no one can ever have enough of! There have been so many opportunities through my service that I never would have had otherwise. I never felt pressured to "prove" myself like in many past entry level positions. During my service year, I was constantly in an encouraging environment where everyone wanted me to succeed, gain experiences that would benefit me, and prepare me for the future."

Community Partnerships

An important aspect of our mission is creating and maintaining ties with the community. We do this by partnering with a number of civic and government organizations to reach new audiences and provide education and resources. During the past year we have been very successful in maintaining and expanding these valuable partnerships.

Integrated Plan Field Day:

Each year, we partner with the City of Springfield, Greene County, City Utilities, Ozark Greenways, and Watershed Committee of the Ozarks to educate team members about the Springfield-Greene County Integrated Plan for the Environment.

Attendees enjoyed a tour of the Southwest Wastewater Treatment Plant and a presentation on the environmental history of the region. After lunch, participants headed to Wilson's Creek National Battlefield for a presentation and educational float. We learned about the National Park Service's efforts to monitor and protect water quality, as well as the impact the Springfield metro area has on this tributary of the James.



Memberships in Civic Organizations:

JRBP's membership with the Springfield, Nixa, and Ozark chambers of commerce allows us to spread our water quality message throughout Southwest Missouri. By networking with local businesses and community leaders, JRBP continues to develop corporate partnerships that provide sustainable funding for our mission and an opportunity to bring our mission, programs, and events to new audiences.

Invasive Species Monitoring



JRBP is a member of the Missouri Department of Conservation's Southwest Missouri Hydrilla Working Group, which is made up of a collection of local organizations that assist with aquatic invasive species monitoring and eradication. In late summer 2022, JRBP assisted with hydrilla monitoring on Lake Springfield.

Heading out for a day on the lake or river? Always remember to follow "Clean, Drain, Dry" principles and inspect your boat and gear for aquatic hitchhikers. Never dump live bait or aquariums into local waters.

Collaboration with 37 North Expeditions

Springfield Brewing Company Outdoor Education Series:

JRBP, 37 North Expeditions, and Springfield Brewing Company hosted a monthly education series from March to August, with each session featuring presentations on topics related to conservation and outdoor recreation. Attendees learned about paddling safety, birding, bike maintenance, and toured the Jordan Creek underground. Thank you Springfield Brewing Company for hosting this series!

James River Float: While poor weather and low water cancelled most of the original float series, we

did get out on the water with 37 North on one adventure, from Tailwaters to Rivercut Golf Course. It was a hot day, but the water was cool and refreshing, and participants were able to experience a beautiful and seldom-visited section of the James River.

Paddle MO James

JRBP partnered with Stream Teams United to host a Paddle MO James float – a 3-day, 22-mile adventure from Hootentown to Galena. The event attracted forty participants, many who were experiencing the James River for the

first time. Paddlers enjoyed presentations by JRBP staff in the evenings, including a history of the Jim Owen float trips, the flora and fauna of the James, and local foraging. During each day's float we experienced geographic wonders like the Hootentown Natural Arch, identified macroinvertebrates, and learned about other critters living in and around the river.




Financial Summary

In addition to our operating funds, JRBP has an endowment fund held by the Community Foundation of the Ozarks. This fund helps to ensure the long-term financial sustainability of our organization. The value of this fund at the end of the fiscal year was \$582,480.58.

JRBP has historically depended on federal grant revenue for the majority of our funding. In order to maintain a more healthy and sustainable blend of revenue, a target was established for the total revenue stream to be composed of 25% grant funding, 25% membership fees, 25% fundraising, and 25% contract income. Through an increased focus on contracts, our membership program, and our annual Sunset Soiree fundraiser, we moved closer to these goals.
